PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents,

In this issue I would like to focus on the topic of values education, the inculcation of values into our students in CPASS, how this experience could continue in your family and how you could play your part.

First, I would like to share about the concept of 'Values Language'. When we use the 'Values Language', we purposefully infuse values into our daily interactions with our students. In everything that they do, we find opportunities to explain to them that the behaviour which they have displayed has a value attached to it. For example, when a student completes a task after repeated attempts, we would explicitly use the word "Resilience" so that students are able to understand and 'see' the link between their behaviour and the value. We could say "Jimmy, I am happy to see that you have tried very hard to complete this task. You have shown the value of Resilience." Or when a student has waited patiently for his/her turn in a class activity, the teacher would say "Anne, thank you for waiting patiently for your classmate to complete this matching task. You have shown Respect to your friend." This explicit use of the 'Values Language' and link between behaviour and value is necessary to help our students understand how their behaviours have underlying values. Such reinforcement from adults would motivate them to develop an inner desire to display more of such positive behaviours and eventually form the character that we desire to see in them.

Providing opportunities for students to be involved in daily school assemblies is an excellent way for them to acquire positive experiences as role models for school values. For the daily school assembly, students are rostered by class to lead in the flag raising or lowering ceremony. Regardless of their communication ability or mode or hand function, assistive technologies such as Big Mack or iPad, are at hand to assist them perform their duty to lead in the National Pledge taking ceremony. These opportunities to lead the school assembly provide positive experiences that increase the students' self-confidence and self-esteem. In addition, all students are given opportunities to greet the School every day. Most students have learned to use common phrases such as "Have a great day!", yet some students have begun to use more creative greetings like "Have an awesome Monday!". When the student has greeted the school, both staff and students would reply with "Thank you, Wahida. Have an awesome Monday too!" Hence, do not be surprised when your child wishes you with "Have a great day!" and we encourage you to affirm his/her initiative efforts by wishing him/her with "Thank you my child, have a great day too!"

For our students to exhibit positive behaviours as part of their daily routine, we encourage parents and family members to look out for such positive moments at home and use the 'Values Language' to help your child see that their positive behaviours are also welcomed and encouraged at home. In your family, you could provide opportunities for your child to help with household chores. For example, you could 'assign' your child the duty to water the house plants. Whether your child does the duty independently or with adult supervision/assistance, this task would enable your child to develop a sense of responsibility for the home. When your child persevered to complete the task, please remember to use the 'Values Language' to link his/her behaviour to values such as Confidence, Responsibility or Resilience.

You could ask "Is there a need to teach our students values?" The answer is a definite "Yes!" because with the right values, our students would be guided in life especially when they have to make decisions for themselves. Just as Roy Disney said, "It's not hard to make decisions when you know what your values are." At CPASS, we teach values to prepare our students for tomorrow. Let us work together and practise the use of 'Values Language' every day with your child.

Stay healthy and have a great Term Four ahead!

special milestone brought the National Day Parade back to Padang, where Singapore's first ever National Day Parade was held.




All of us joined voices and came together as one to sing classic National Day's song such as "Home".

Through the various running events and competition, we hoped to develop in our students a greater appreciation for sports as well as the qualities of sportsmanship, teamwork and strength of character.



CCA Overseas Trip 2019




Updates on Staff Training


Prefect's Training
