Dear Parents.

Since the easing of Covid Safe Management Measures (SMM) from 26 April 2022, I am so glad and delighted to share that life at CPASS has gradually returned to much normalcy.

As daily flag raising and lowering ceremonies, and weekly Tuesday assemblies resumed, it was heartening to see students interacting with their peers when they gathered at the assembly area and school hall. Students rejoiced when class outings, learning journeys resumed, and listened gleefully as teachers shared plans on the places that they would be visiting. With the resumption of community mobility training, Functional Senior class students have become more active in the community again as they resumed practice of skills which they have learnt in class into an authentic environment, such as the public transport, supermarkets, and shops.

The students had the opportunity to participate in the preparation of food items from the respective countries.

For the booth from Indonesia, students learnt that the brand of instant noodles, Indomie, was staple food popular in the country. The Indonesian brand of instant noodles had a rich variety of flavours. At the booth, students participated in packing cooked Indomie noodles into hawker paper, guided by teachers and parent volunteers. For the booth from Mexico, tacos and salsa (dipping sauce for tacos) was presented. Students were guided in the preparation of the salsa which comprised of tomatoes, onions, cilantro, and lemon juice. For the booth from Thailand, traditional Thai food such as Tom Yum soup, a type of sour and spicy soup, cooked with prawns was presented. Each student was given a bowl of spicy tom yum soup to taste. For the booth from Philippines, the Halo-Halo dessert made of shaved ice, milk/coconut milk and topped with fruits, beans, and yam was presented. For the booth from Japan, onigiri was presented. Students watched a demonstration of making onigiri before trying to make one for themselves, under the guidance of teachers.

Full bellies and happy smiles on the faces of everyone showed that the event was a successful one. Kind compliments affirmed the efforts of the team led by Ms Nur Nabila Binte Mohammed Ali and Mr Yang Junwei. They were supported by members from the NE Committee as well as parent volunteers.

With the easing of the Safe Management Measures (SMM) from the start of Term 2 this year, the Functional senior students had the opportunity to resume work attachments in the community. One of our students, Muhammad Ryyan Zufayri Bin Mohamed Sani, from class 22A, began his work attachment at the Food Platelets, a café serving the general public as well as the blood donors at the Blood Bank @ Health Sciences Authority. Hence, it was an exciting day when two staff from SGE visited Ryyan at his work attachment site!

For this year's GTKY for Ryyan, SGE staff were able to observe him performed various tasks such as tying teabags, peeling potatoes and stocking up plastic utensils and drinks. They were impressed with his attention to details and that he could do most tasks on his own, with minimal supervision. They were also heartened to see Ryyan's co-workers being so friendly and helpful towards him. Towards the end of the session, they sat down to have a casual conversation with Ryyan, he shared that he hoped to work in the Food & Beverage or Hospitality industries in future.

SGE has informed CPASS that Muhammad Ryyan Zufayri Bin Mohamed Sani has been successful in being selected for the 2023 S2W Transition Programme. Well done Ryyan!

Gardening Professional Learning Team (PLT) Vegepods Project - Growing of Vegetables

In 2022 Term 2, Gardening PLT provided a platform for teachers to challenge their students to be urban farmers and grow vegetables for their own consumption. They encouraged the students to take ownership of their very own 'plot of land'. Six vegepods were snapped up by the classes, one for Academic class, three for Functional classes and two for High Support classes. Students from these classes chose to grow vegetables such as 'pek chye', 'kai Lan', lettuce and spinach. Each vegepod was labelled with the students' names and class. The PLT team also pinned a picture of the type of vegetable each class was growing to encourage the students as well as to instil a sense of pride. The main objective of the vegepod challenge was for our students to do their best and remain committed to a decision they have made.

Our little farmers watered, fertilised and cared for the vegepods regularly as a class. Teachers were even able to include Science lessons such as the stages of plant growth and life cycle of plant. Students learnt many other soft skills, such as turn taking, responsibility, patience and teamwork. Each class was encouraged to record their experience through journaling, which made learning fun and interesting. All the vegepods were placed along the assembly area, and it was a delight to see the students performing their gardening duties enthusiastically and checking on the growth of their plot. Many staff from CPAS also came to admire the vegetables grown in the vegepods.

The Gardening PLT team members felt heartened by the excitement displayed by the students as they anticipated the harvest of the vegetables and the sharing of the fruits of their labour. All these life lessons from the humble 'pek chye', 'kai Lan', lettuce and spinach, wow!



Traffic Light and Sensory Pathway (Assembly Area Floor Mural)

The Traffic Light and Sensory Pathway Project was a Professional Learning Team (PLT) project undertaken by the Adaptive PE PLT.

In 2020, at the beginning stages of the project, Adaptive PE PLT did some research and decided to embark on creating a 'Sensory Pathway' for the students to help improve their vestibular, tactile and visual senses. The team designed and created a 'Sensory Pathway' by using colourful carpet tapes to the floor on the area outside the school hall. The team also provided simple instructions on how to use the 'Sensory Pathway' to guide their students. A group of students were selected to trial the pathway and the data collected supported the hypothesis that when students used the pathway, there would be improvements to the students' overall sensory well-being which could further improve the students' attention span in class.

From this project's exciting findings, school leaders encouraged the PLT to make the 'Sensory Pathway' a permanent feature on school ground. The team was further challenged to design a road safety area for teachers to conduct road safety lessons and for students to practice for their community mobility skills, as well as an area for students to be trained to use their wheelchairs. After many brainstorming sessions, discussions and deliberation, the team decided to incorporate all three ideas into one enormous project. The design to incorporate all three ideas must be practical and aesthetically pleasant. The assembly area was recommended for the new design, to replace the design of the snake and ladder game.

With no stone left unturned, the team painstakingly looked into every detail, such as procuring traffic lights for teachers to teach road safety lessons. The activities for the 'Sensory Pathway' had to include exercises that must keep students interested and engaged. A computer keyboard feature was included in the design because it would allow students to become familiar with the positions of the letters of the alphabet on the keyboard.



When the design was eventually completed, everyone was in awe. The teachers and students were very happy and excited because they have a permanent place to teach road safety lessons, a safe place to practise community mobility skills as well as a space to train students on how to manoeuver and park their wheelchairs. With this new permanent feature, it would help teachers and allied professionals to impart important life skills to students and students would have fun learning.


CPASS Outdoor Education Programme

In the last week of Term 1, on 11 March 2022, three niche CCA groups, Scouts CCA, Track & Field CCA and Swimming CCA took part in a one day Outdoor Programme which was conducted by facilitators from Republic Polytechnic.

During the programme, students were introduced to navigational skills which they applied in an activity within the school compound. Students learnt to make their own compasses as well as to read the different bearings by using their compasses. The students learnt to locate the compass bearings of different locations in CPAS, such as the running tracks at Level 4, and the playground at Level 1. Students also had the opportunity to participate in outdoor cooking. They learnt to use common kitchen tools and other equipment such as mess tins and portable stoves to make apple crumble. All the students demonstrated good teamwork in the food preparation and clean-up activity.

At the end of the programme, students were assisted through an active reviewing session to share about their experiences and their feelings from the day's activities. Everyone enjoyed the programme and looked forward to the next outdoor activity in Term 2.

Food Safety Course Level 1

In the second week of Term 2, five Functional Senior students and eight teachers attended the Food Safety Course conducted by Shatec Institutes Pte Ltd, on school premise. The course was conducted over three days, 28 March to 30 March 2022, with an assessment where participants sat for a written test and a practical session on the last day. Topics covered in the course included hygiene when handling, cooking, and storing food and beverages.

Teachers paired up with students as buddies to ensure that the students understood what was taught during the course as well as the questions that were asked during the assessment. To cater to the needs of our students during the practical session, the course facilitator prepared the concrete materials as well as pictures of the materials as visual aids. Several students used the Proloquo2Go application on their devices to respond to the teachers and course facilitator.

At the end of the three-day course, all teachers and students were certified food handlers. This would ensure that both teachers and students would maintain safety and hygiene when handling food in school or at work attachment sites.

World Boccia Challenger 2022

On 2 April to 9 April 2022, I participated in the World Boccia Challenger 2022. It was held in Zagreb, Croatia. It was my debut competition in a World Boccia sanctioned event. It was an honour to represent Singapore to compete with other players at an international level.

I felt nervous before the trip as I did not know what to expect from the competition. However, I felt more relaxed after the first match. I finished in fourth position out of 14 participants in the individual event. For the pair event which I participated with my senior, Toh Sze Ning, and we won the bronze medal. Sze Ning graduated from CPASS too.

Being the youngest and non-ranked participant in this competition, It was indeed an eye opener for me. I learnt that I have to remain calm during the match, especially when I was not leading in the scores. I also learnt that I have to persevere and remain focussed, I will remember all this and aspire to do better in the next competition!

From this competition, I became officially classified as a BC3 player by sports governing body, Boccia International Sports Federation (BISFed). BC3 is a Paralympic Boccia classification, this category is for players with a very severe physical disability, including cerebral palsy. Players use a device to assist them and also can be helped by a nominated person at the court. The assistant must keep his/her back to the court, and they cannot give advice on where to throw or kick the next ball to get it closest to the jack. Due to the classification, I would also be attributed with a world ranking. Aside from official classification and adrenaline from the competition, the best rewards for me was to befriend many Boccia peers from around the world, this alone was simply awesome!
