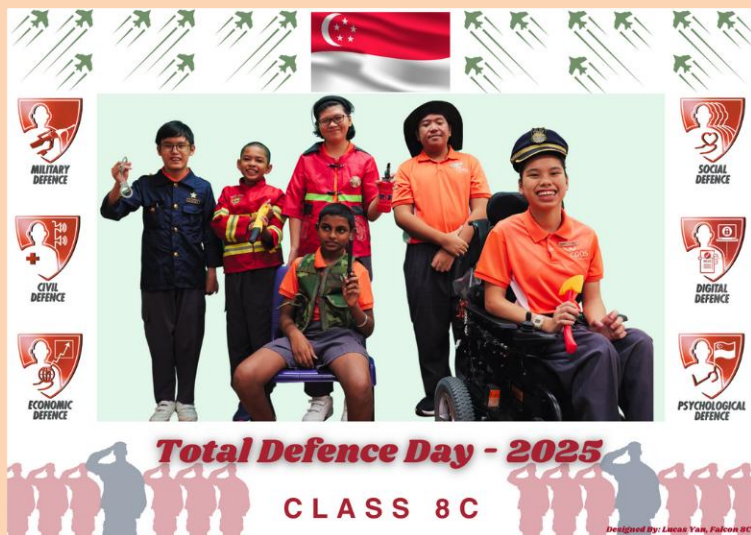

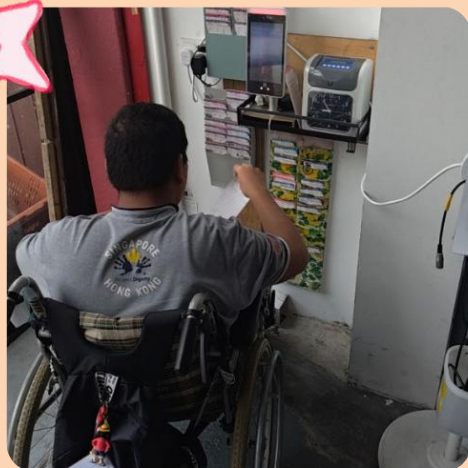

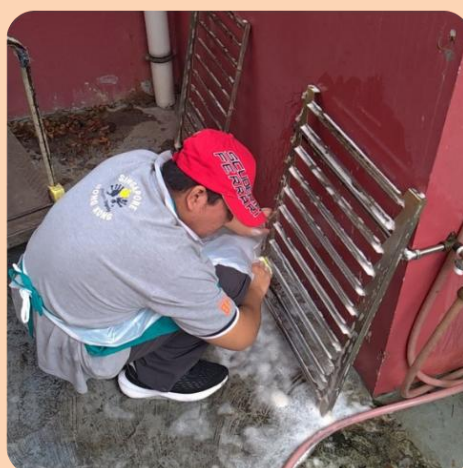

TRIP TO SEMULA ASIA IN TERM 1

Ever wondered how plastic is really recycled? Falcon 8C did, and on 9 January 2025 (Thursday), they visited Semula Asia to find out!

Students saw firsthand how plastic milk cartons collected from bubble tea stores are broken down into plastic filings, melted, and repurposed into new products. They were even surprised to learn that the furniture they sat on was made from recycled plastic!

The visit highlighted the importance of proper recycling—washing plastic thoroughly and removing stickers before disposal. Students also discovered that improperly recycled plastic increases costs and resources needed for processing. Some even got hands-on experience in preparing plastic for recycling!

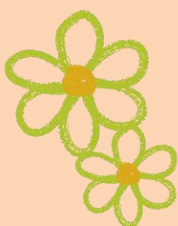
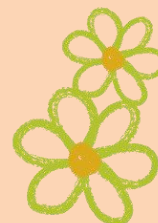

In addition to the OT Day celebration, the CPASS West OT Department hosted a job shadowing experience for four students from National Junior College (NJC) on 22 and 23 January 2025 (Wednesday and Thursday). The NJC students had the opportunity to shadow the daily work of OTs, gaining insights into the role of an OT in a school-based setting. The students observed and participated in a range of activities including therapy sessions, use of adaptive equipment and collaborative meetings with the Trans-disciplinary team members.

Overall, the students shared that it was enlightening to see how the adaptive tools could be integrated in the students' daily activities and it was meaningful to see how the team worked together to set goals and monitor each students' progress.

HSP ENRICHMENT PROGRAMME

In Term 1, 2025, a group of High Support Programme (HSP) students participated in four sessions of activities conducted by Mr Najib from Majulah Green. The students engaged in sensory exploration of natural or nature-inspired materials through their senses of sight, touch, auditory and smell.

Touch and Discover; Nature's Textures and Shapes

In the first session, students engaged their senses of sight and touch through the exploration of a variety of leaves and seeds. With the help of their caregivers, they made a transfer of the leaf textures through a leaf rubbing activity using crayons and colour pencils. With the creative use of the natural materials, the students worked together with their caregivers to create collages.

Smell and Tell; Scented Craft

In the second session, the focus was on engaging their sense of smell. We explored mint leaves, pandan leaves, sawtooth coriander and played a guessing game with some food grade flavourings. We ended the session with an activity using flour dough, made a scented dough by incorporating the flavouring into the dough.

Sounds Around Us; Nature Maracas

In this session, students played a guessing game of animal and nature sounds. This was followed by the making of cup phones using paper cups and strings. Students tried using the cup phones to transmit sounds to one another. To end the session, students went on a parade around the school compound with their handmade maracas/shakers using recycled materials and lentils.

Farm Heroes; Nature Fun

In this session, the students explored the texture of different plant parts and soil. They created their own potted plants by engaging in a planting activity with seeds and soil. With the remaining plant parts and paints, they made marks and created prints.

Through this term's enrichment programme, the exploration of the presented materials allowed students to be connected to the natural world.

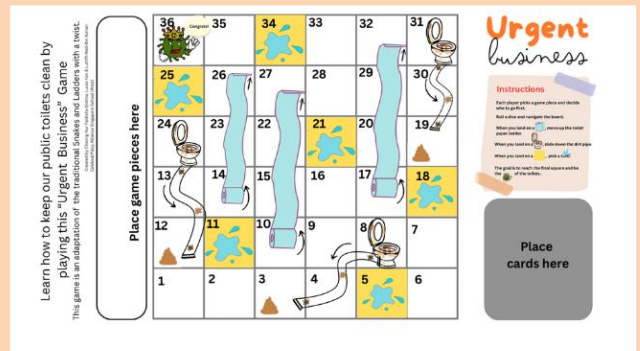

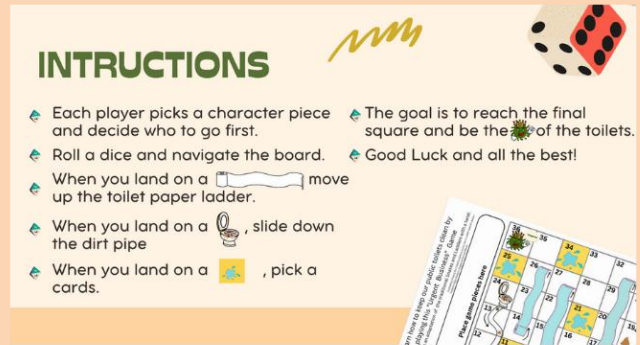
